REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

During the year 2022/ 2023, the Trustees met in June, September and December 2022 and in March 2023 to discuss the maintenance and updates required to the siren system.

The Trustees were faced with notice being served by the new owners of the former Astra Zeneca site in Avonmouth in April 2021. Following advice from our legal team, work began apace to find a new suitable location for the siren to ensure continuation of coverage of the siren system to the Severn Beach residents.

During the past year, work has progressed slowly on the relocation of Siren 8 from the former Astra Zeneca site in Avonmouth to the land owned by Severnside Distribution Park (Bristol) Management Limited. Whilst the groundwork investigation work was completed in April 2022 and the groundworks commenced in mid-May 2022 high-powered electrical cables were discovered which then had to be moved in order for the groundworks to be completed. This caused a significant delay. Following the move of the high-powered cables, the groundworks were completed and the physical move of the siren is due to take place on 14th May 2023. Once the siren is relocated, Western Power Distribution will connect the siren to the electricity network. Only then can a metre be installed and the siren be fully operational.

I would like to convey my thanks to the group of local volunteers who monitor each siren on monthly test day and report defects to the administration.

The Upper Tier COMAH sites have continued their support by contributing to the ongoing maintenance and running of the Trust and the majority of Lower Tier sites also willingly contribute as they also have a moral duty to warn and inform the public. The Trustees will work with new COMAH sites to agree payments for the system.

The Trust has received the resignation of Ian Roberts and Robert Griffin from the Board of Trustees both of whom will stand down at the AGM. I would like to thank Ian and Robert for their work as Trustees and wish them both a happy and long retirement.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow Trustees for their support of the Severnside Sirens Trust and Victoria Bywater our Administrator for her work on behalf of the Trust. It is my intention to stand down as Chairman of the Trust at the AGM in 2024 but in the meantime I look forward to working with the Trustees and our administration team over the coming year.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

The Board of Trustees present their report together with the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2023.

Objects

The company was incorporated on 1 May 1997. The objects of the charity are the establishment of an early warning system and to assist government departments and local authorities in their provision of emergency services.

Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees who have served during the year are set out on page 1. Trustees are invited to join to either represent their local authority or their particular industry. Trustees retire by rotation and may stand for reappointment.

Investment Powers

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make any investments which the Trustees see fit.

Related Parties

The charity has a very close relationship with Bristol City Council, North Somerset Council and South Gloucestershire Council, all of which have provided funding to enable the charity to carry out its charitable objectives.

Trustees' Responsibilities in Relation to the Financial Statements

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity at the end of the financial year and of its surplus or deficit for the financial year. In doing so the Trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practices have been followed subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the accounts; and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023 contd

The Trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enables them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of The Trust and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. The Trustees consider that the Independent Examiner has been provided with all relevant information.

Reserves Policy and Risk Management

The Trusts cash reserves should be maintained at a level sufficient to meet both the commitments to maintenance of the system and the administration costs for a period of twenty four months, which currently equates to approximately £62,000. This is the minimum amount of liquid funds that should be readily available.

This would meet funding for the period in the event of a significant drop in income from the funds provided by the local councils and COMAH sites after which it would be necessary to consider how the funding would be replaced, or activities changed.

Assets

The maintenance of the system is managed by a technically qualified sub-contractor according to a contract. The records of the system failures and maintenance are reviewed by the Trustees at the management meetings.

A reserves policy is in place, which ensures the availability of sufficient cash for the trust to operate for 24 months. Details of the SST reserves were last confirmed to the Trusts auditors in April 2018.

Management and Administration

The Trustees meet four times a year and discusses the administration, maintenance, funding, performance and improvements of the system

Full records are held of all details relating to performance of the system since November 2016.

SST is administered by an out-sourced administration company (Cooksley & Co Ltd) and a formal performance review by the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Trustees takes place annually.

Legislation and Regulation

A copy of the annual report, financial statements and statutory returns are filed as required on-line to the Charity Commission and Companies House.

All data and records kept by the Trust, relating to the business and individuals associated with providing the siren system, will not be passed to a third party without the approval of the relevant persons.

Conflict of Interest

In order that all who have dealings with SST can have total confidence in the integrity of its decision-making process, all trustees and those involved in administering the Trust will strive to avoid any conflict of interests between the Trust and their own personal, professional and business interests. This includes avoiding actual, as well as perceived, conflicts of interest.

Conflicts of interest could arise if, for example, a Trustee has a business that may be engaged in providing services for the Trust on a commercial basis.

Upon appointment each Trustee will be expected to make the Board aware of interests, such as relationships, and posts held, that could potentially result in a conflict of interest. Such notification should be made in writing. It will be kept on file and should be updated as appropriate. Likewise, all Trustees are expected to make similar disclosure if during a meeting a matter arises which could involve a conflict between that Trustee's interests and those of the Trust.

In such a case, the Trustee in question must accept that he/she may be asked to leave the room while the discussion takes place and may not be able to take part in the decision depending on the judgement of the other Trustees present at the time. Any such disclosure and the subsequent actions taken will be noted in the minutes.

This policy is meant to supplement good judgement. The Trustees should respect its spirit as well as its wording.

Independent Examiner

The criteria for requiring a statutory audit have relaxed, and the Trustees resolved to amend the Memorandum and Articles of Association to require an Independent Examination of the accounts. Brooking Ruse was duly appointed as Independent Examiner of these Financial Statements.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting
